This being our 14th year, we decided that in addition to our Volunteer of the Year Award (see front page) it was time to add a second annual award to recognize those volunteers, staff, and members who have greatly contributed to the success of this organization in their own special ways. In January, we awarded the first annual "Dakota Award", to recognize those individuals who have consistently donated their time, effort and/or money to the Center, for an extended period of time. She has been a part of the Center since and has witnessed both good and bad times over the years. Even after accepting a full time office position with the Center, Lisa continues to donate her time every season raising baby squirrels, woodchucks, thirteen-lined ground squirrels, and even chipmunks. The overwhelming amount of time spent organizing our annual banquet, in addition to her regular duties, makes Lisa an invaluable asset to the organization. For all these reasons, we couldn't imagine a more deserving person to be recognized with our first annual Dakota Award.

WINC's Volunteer Veterinarians

Did you know that WINC has three veterinarians that volunteer their time to help the animals? Depending on the situation, they may perform medical procedures on site, or at their clinics.

Dr. Holly Pollard-Wright is our volunteer Medical Director and has been helping WINC's animals since January of 2007. She works at VCA Associates in Pet Care in Waukesha. She also volunteers to help the wildlife at the Wisconsin Humane Society Wildlife Rehabilitation Center in Milwaukee. Dr. Pollard's specialty is orthopedic surgery, which is just what we need for animals with broken bones. She has done numerous surgeries on Red-tailed, Rough-legged and Cooper's Hawks, Great Horned Owls, Blue and Green Herons, Opossums, Raccoons, squirrels, and many others.

Dr. Nicki Waliszewski started volunteering her services in the early fall of 2007. She currently works at the Mukwonago Animal Hospital. She has done internships, externships and training at Tufts University Wildlife Clinic, the Wildlife Center of Virginia, Northwoods Wildlife Center, Milwaukee County Zoo and Lincoln Park Zoo. She has also assisted with field work on Black Bear, White-tailed Deer and Bison. Some of Nicki's patients at WINC have included: Red-tailed Hawks, a Cooper's Hawk, Screech Owl, Barred Owl, Great Horned Owl, a Northern Shrike, a Gray Squirrel and an Opossum.

Dr. Paul Gibbons has just started his volunteering experience with WINC. He currently works at the Animal Emergency Center in Milwaukee as their Exotic Animal Specialist. He is the only board certified avian veterinarian in Wisconsin. At the emergency clinic, he specializes in not only birds, but reptiles, amphibians, rabbits, rodents and other exotic animal pets. He is currently serving as a consultant for our Center and the other volunteer veterinarians, as well as participating in monthly veterinary rounds to evaluate all of our patients.

Location, Location

So please change the dish water <u>frequently</u> and follow the proper rinsing and bleaching procedures.

Every Volunteer Should Know:

- You have to be eighteen years of age or older to volunteer in Animal Care.
- Baby Bird Feeders must be fourteen years of age or older. Twelve and thirteen year olds must be with a parent or guardian.
- before they arrive at the facility. If you are interested in showing a member of your family, or a friend what it is that you do at the Center, just check with staff beforehand. All visitors (including your family and friends, the public,, ex-volunteers and ex-staff), must stop at the office before proceeding to the clinic. All visitors must be escorted by a member of staff, or the volunteer who has received approval for their visitor. If you are unclear about our visitor policy, please ask a member of the staff.
- Volunteers should check out with staff before leaving for the day. Why? There are many times that a special project needs to be completed, or maybe the office could use help with a mailing, or due to the day being so busy, it's not until the end of the shift that staff is able to share important information with you and your group.
- Vacation/Time Off/Shift Change request slips are found in the sleeve on the side of the red bird-house, located on the volunteer table. Please complete the slip and drop it off in the birdhouse if you will be requesting time off.

New Volunteer Orientation


